Options Incorporated recognizes a duty of care within the context of travel risk management related to the Health and Safety Workplace Violence and Harassment Policies. As a result, domestic business travel will include the collection of information, assessment of hazards and threats, education, monitoring of travel related activity, with attention to the specific demographic of business traveller.

The travel risk assessment must be completed prior to departure for an initial client visit to identify extreme/high risk categories and develop mitigation strategies and/or adjust travel/employment plans accordingly. The risk assessment is a living document and may be amended at any time before, during, after the trip to capture the travellers experience.
